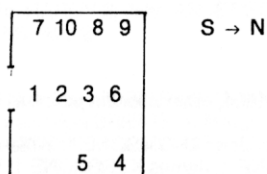


9B GARGUNNOCK, LECKIE

LECKIE

Private burial ground now "lost" in a grove of overgrown yews. Ten identical small white freestanding crosses, with initials and dates on their plinths, are in a dirty and broken state in a locked and railed stone enclosure. All inscriptions were recorded in 2002.

Notes

W B Cook, *The Lairds of Leckie* (1906, reprinted from the *Stirling Sentinel*). The Grahams of Leckie seem to have had right of burial in St. Andrews Chapel or the Garden Aisle, West Church, Stirling; pp 20-5 the MOIRs of Leckie from Doune; pp 25-29 - Dr Robt MOIR d 1819 and buried at Leckie, his wife Ann STEWART & son Charles. Dr Chas Alexr GRAHAM took the name of MOIR on succeeding to Leckie in 1820, d 1845 age 73; his wife Henrietta HAY was buried "in the family burying ground at Leckie" (NGR: NS 657 932, in wood near waterfall, no path) and his son Robt GRAHAM MOIR dropped the name of MOIR & retained Boquhapple; p 22 David MOIR, surgeon in Stirling. The estate was sold in 1906 to Sir Geo YOUNGER bart.
